Course description and objectives

The aim of the course is to provide analysis on economic globalization. The course addresses several issues such as firms' policy, international economics, migrations, trade agreements and global environmental issues. The course also focuses on inequality issues that come along the economic globalization process and their political extensions.

Prerequisites

The students that can follow this course may come from different fields such as economics, management, business administration, political sciences, mathematics, sociology.

Learning outcomes

At the end of the course, the students dispose of a complete framework for analyzing firms' and countries' strategies in a global work. It also allows students to understand current social tensions and conflicts.

Assignments and grading

- 50% of the grade comes from group work on a given topic and the presentation of its outcome.
- 50% of the grade comes from a final exam.

The numerical grade distribution will dictate the final grade. The passing grade for a course is 10/20.

Class participation: Active class participation – this is what makes classes lively and instructive. Come on time and prepared. Class participation is based on quality of comments, not quantity.

Exam policy: In the exam, students will not be allowed to bring any document (except if allowed by the lecturer). Unexcused absences from exams or failure to submit cases will result in zero grades in the calculation of numerical averages. Exams are collected at the end of examination periods.
