I- About Université Paris Dauphine-PSL


About us

Université Paris Dauphine - PSL is a highly selective French university specialized in the Organization and Decision Sciences. It combines the strengths of a public research and teaching university with those of a top-tier international business school. Fields of study include Management, Finance, Economics, Law, Political Science, Sociology, Computer Science & Artificial Intelligence and Applied Mathematics.

Université Paris Dauphine - PSL offers multidisciplinary programs at all academic levels: Bachelor's, Master's, PhD and Executive Education. Our curriculum is internationally focused and rich. Academics are supported by our research activities, meaning that students benefit from the most recent advances in their field of study. Class sizes are small, and programs are taught both in French and in English by a multidisciplinary, highly qualified faculty, engaged in applied research and in close contact with the business world.

Where to find us

Université Paris Dauphine - PSL's main campus is located at Porte Dauphine, in western Paris not far from the Bois de Boulogne. It is easily accessible via public transportation: metro (line 2 - Porte Dauphine station), commuter trains (RER line C - Avenue Foch station), and there are two bike-share stations close by.







II- Organization of our courses

Course credits

You can choose to take up to 30 ECTS (European Credit Transfer and Accumulation System) per semester but you must follow the pedagogical conditions imposed by your home institution. Unless under exceptional circumstances agreed upon by both Dauphine and your home university, you cannot attend more than 30 ECTS worth of courses per semester.

Some course descriptions indicate 2, 3, 4, 5 or 6 ECTS for a given course, but those are meant for degree-seeking students. Exchange students will receive either 3 or 6 ECTS per course. The correct number of ECTS for each course is indicated on the registration website.

The Intensive French as a Foreign Language Seminar is worth 3 ECTS. It can either be included as part of your 30 ECTS OR added in addition to them. The seminar is the only instance in which a student can register for a total of 33 ECTS.

The exact number of courses or credits you need to take also depends on your home institution's requirements. Your academic advisor or exchange coordinator should inform you of the number of courses and credits required to pass the semester.

Registering for courses

To register for courses, follow these steps.

STEP 1: Once you have been accepted into a Dauphine - PSL exchange program, you will receive an email explaining how to register for courses on our dedicated website.

STEP 2: You can select courses at your current academic level for up to 30 ECTS. Your course load must be primarily in your major or area of study (Economics, Management, Law, Political Science and Sociology) but can within certain limits also include courses in other disciplines, electives or a language course (French as a Foreign Language).

For example, for 30 ECTS, a Business & Management major can select:

- 3 to 4 courses out of 5 in Management (for 18 or 24 ECTS)
- plus 1 to 2 courses outside of their major. For example, 1 or 2 courses in Economics, Sociology or Political Science (for 6 or 12 ECTS).

Remember, whatever your major or area of study, you can only choose courses at your own academic level (undergraduate/graduate).

The course registration platform allows you to choose your courses freely. However, the system does not account for course prerequisites or limited registration capacity. The system tracks the number of ECTS and the area of study in which you have been nominated and will only show you courses you are allowed to take. Make sure you meet all the prerequisites for a class before registering by reading its syllabus.

STEP 3: Before finalizing your selection of courses and completing registration formalities, please ensure that your home institution has approved your choice of courses. No changes are possible once registration has been completed.





Academic Departments

International Exchange Students can take courses in all three Dauphine - PSL academic departments (LSO, MSO, MIDO) as well as courses offered by the Office of International Affairs.

Dauphine - PSL uses course codes to describe and organize our course catalogue in order to make it easy to identify what academic department and what level of study a course belongs to. The course prefix (OI, 3L, 4M, 5M, 3A, 4A and 5A) indicates the academic level of the course (see chart below).

Like all French universities, Université Paris Dauphine - PSL follows the Bachelor's, Master's, PhD (BMD) system, known as the *Licence, Master, Doctorat or LMD* in French. 1st, 2nd and 3rd year Bachelor's students are considered undergraduates. Graduate students include those enrolled in 1st and 2nd year Master's programs (years 4 and 5 at the university). If your home university uses a different system, Dauphine -PSL will take that into account for your course selection.

French as a Foreign Language (FLE)

Université Paris Dauphine - PSL offers 2 options for learning or improving your French language skills, from beginner to advanced level:

• The intensive seminar at the beginning of the semester:

Worth 3 ECTS

1 week, 24 hours (20 hours in class, 4 hours in e-learning), a final test and a certificate of your level.

Fun activities to learn French

Small groups from beginner to advanced level.

200 euros fees (payment on a dedicated platform). If you completed your registration, no refunds are possible.

AND / OR

• Semester long courses:

Each course is worth 6 ECTS, you can take up to 2 of them.

Classes last fall semester and have to be validated during a final exam.

You do not need to pay for these classes. Only the seminar requires additional fees.

You can choose **ONE OR BOTH** options. To make faster progress in French, we recommend you do both. It will help you to fit in Dauphine's student life, to meet French people and to handle daily life situations (at the grocery store or at the restaurant for example)






If you would like to take a language course without including it in your Learning Agreement (ex. if your university does not recognize language credits), you may do so, but will need to contact us first. Priority is given to students who will be credited for the course. If there are no remaining seats on the course, you won't be able to attend as an unregistered student.

You may register for a FLE course which is at your current proficiency level or one proficiency level above or below your current level. For example, if you are currently at level B1, you may register for an A2, B1, or B2 course.

Both intensive and semester-long courses are organized by proficiency level according to the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFR).



Welcome Week

The University organizes a Welcome Meeting and Orientation Week each semester for all new international students:

- First semester: September 2nd to September 6th
- Second semester: January 6th to January 10th

Attendance is mandatory during the whole week. There, you will receive your student ID, a welcome pack with documents and goodies, your certificate of arrival and all the important information regarding your courses and your student life in Dauphine.

Some department courses can start during the Welcome Week. If they overlap with a regular event, we advise you to skip it and get to class. However, if it clashes with a seminar course, you will be excused if you choose to attend the seminar course (and it will be considered as a "justified absence" to your professor).

If you have a serious reason to be absent during the Orientation week, please contact us as soon as possible.

Attendance and Academics

Dauphine - PSL's curriculum is based on classroom presence and participation. While on exchange, students are expected to behave in an exemplary manner with respect towards members of the faculty, other students, university administrative staff and host organizations.

<u>Schedule</u>: Your online schedule becomes visible at the beginning of the semester. Make sure you activate your PASSPORT account as soon as you receive the relevant email, so you can access it as soon as it becomes available.

<u>Scoring system</u>: In France, the rating scale extends from 0 to 20 (0 being the lowest score and 20 the highest). An average of 10/20 for each course is required to obtain ECTS credits.

Exams: You must attend all of your exams. Remote examinations are not possible, even for exchange students. This has been decided to allow all students to be assessed under the same conditions. You are allowed to contest a grade, at which point the university will review your claim and give you an answer within two months.

<u>Juries & Retakes</u>: There is no compensation of grade: if you get a score under 10/20 in a single course, you will be called to resit the exam (usually in June, on site exclusively, for both semester 1 and semester 2 courses). An interdepartmental commission, taking place each year in February for the first semester and in May for the second semester, have a final say on your grades. If you can't attend the retake exam, inquire with your home university about the possibility to do the retake internally.

<u>Disability & Special arrangements</u>: If you have a disability that may affect your exams or your overall student life, please contact **handicap@dauphine.psl.eu** at the start of the semester or immediately after you have had the injury.

Fundamendal rules:

- ATTENDANCE AND PUNCTUALITY ARE COMPULSORY. A student who is late and has not been admitted to class by the professor will be considered absent. Class attendance is also a requisite for validating your ECTS credits. If a student does not respect the rules, teachers may exclude them from class. You must inform both your professor and the courses coordinators from the International Affairs Office (courses.exchange@dauphine.fr) of any absence. If you have 3 unjustified absences or more, you may be excluded from class until the end of the semester and your teacher can decide to fail your continuous assessment grade. You can attend the final exam; however, it won't be enough to validate the entire course.
- NO NEGOCIATIONS POSSIBLE WITH THE INSTRUCTORS TO: Get a personalized make-up test for department courses. Change your grade.





NO PLAGIARISM OR CHEATING. Université Paris Dauphine - PSL takes a
very strict stance on plagiarism and cheating, be it in the case of <u>classwork</u>
<u>and assignments or in exams</u>. All work that you turn in (during classes and
during exams), be it written or oral, individual or as a member of a group,
must be your own. Never use someone else's work or ideas without citing
the source.

If you don't respect those rules, you risk being referred to a disciplinary committee and failing the course.

Academic calendar

Each department has a different schedule. Some have a one-week holiday, others do not. Exam weeks and resits are also different. Depending on the courses you select, you will need to take these differences into account. You can review the exact timetables for each semester at the start of each chapter below.

PLEASE NOTE: If you select Master 2 level courses or courses in Law, Mathematics or Computer Science (all levels combined), the exams are generally later than for the other programs (January for the first semester, May for the second semester).

<u>Click here</u> to access the entire course list. On the website, courses in **blue and with a code beginning with "OI"** are managed by us, and you can easily find their description by clicking on them.

PLEASE NOTE: The final course list is the one you will find on the registration platform when you are given access to it. If a course appears on our website, but not on the registration platform, it means that the course is no longer available.

LSO, MSO, MIDO - Course description

Note that the International Affairs Office has no control over the content of the syllabi shared by the departments. If you wish to have more information about each individual course, you need to contact the teacher individually (firstname.lastname@dauphine.psl.eu) or the teaching assistant of the program in which the course belongs to.

<u>Translations</u>: Some syllabi are not translated from French to English, because even if a group is taught in English it's in the context of an English track attended by French speaking students. If you need a translation, please copy the content of the syllabus in a word file, name it « course code - name of the course » and send it to <u>courses.exchange@dauphine.fr</u>.

ECTS: The syllabi of the department courses only show the credits awarded to degree seeking students. As an exchange student, you are not awarded the same amount of credits





(the right amount of credits for exchange students is shown on the registration platform). Generally, you are awarded 3 ECTS for a 2 ECTS course and 6 ECTS for a 4 ECTS course (exceptions to this rule may apply).

<u>Availability of spots</u>: While generally, most courses taught in English in the departments offer some spots to exchange students, availability fluctuates each year (sometimes we get more spots, sometimes less, and sometimes none). Therefore, **this document is not a course catalogue you can check before registration**, but as a directory to get more information on the courses visible on the registration platform.

<u>Course code:</u> Course codes can help you know which program one course belongs to. That is why we sort each program according to their course code.

<u>Links</u>: Each link may redirect you to the French version of the site. This is to avoid issues of the webpage not showing up correctly. You can always change the language of the webpage by clicking « EN » at the top of the page.

3- Courses in Mathematics and Computer Science

MIDO courses (exclusively for students majoring in computer science or mathematics)

Below, you will find a list of courses in the MIDO department open to exchange students. All but two courses are taught at graduate level, make sure that you have a solid background in the subjects before registering. You might be asked to provide a resume indicating your educational background in mathematics and computer sciences.

MIDO's academic calendar is significantly different from those of other departments, so you should also check the MIDO academic calendar for scheduling compatibility with classes you have chosen in other departments. V- Q&As

Course registration

Q: If I have a scheduling conflict and two of my courses overlap, will I still be able to take both of them?

A: **No.** Since attendance is mandatory, it is not possible to take two courses whose schedules overlap.

Q: Can I choose whatever courses I wish?

A: Yes - under certain conditions. You can choose any course at your academic level on the registration website provided that you satisfy the prerequisites. We will approve your course selection contingent on the number of available seats, if you already reach your ECTS limit and prerequisites. You should make sure that your choices are also approved by your home university.

Q: What prerequisites do I need to satisfy?

A: For courses in your major or area of study, Dauphine - PSL will check that you satisfy the prerequisites and that the courses correspond to your academic level. There are no prerequisites for elective courses. We strongly recommend, however, that you do not register for courses for which you lack the necessary background knowledge, skills or prerequisites. Some master programmes require that you send them a resume to access their courses (it will be mentioned on the registration platform).

Q: How many courses should I take?

A: You can take courses for up to 30 ECTS credits. There is no minimum requirement. Your course load depends on the academic requirements of your home institution and your personal preferences. In general, exchange students take between 3 & five courses per semester.

Q: How many French as a Foreign Language (FLE) courses am I allowed to take?

A: You may take up to 2 FLE courses per semester in addition to the intensive French language seminar.

Q: Until when can I modify my course selection?

A: You may modify your selection until the course registration website closes (about 1 week after it opens; either in June/July for the first semester or in November for the second semester) and you receive your finalized Learning Agreement. Once the website is closed, you will no longer be able to modify your course selection/Learning Agreement without permission.

At the beginning of each semester, the International Affairs Office can authorize you to make changes to your Learning Agreement for practical considerations (scheduling conflicts, prerequisite issues). At this stage, the courses coordinators are the only ones who can officialize that change on the course registration website, as you won't have access to the registration platform anymore. Even for the reasons mentioned above, changes to your course selection can be near impossible after the first two weeks of class!



We strongly recommend that you read the description and syllabus for each course you are considering before choosing it and discuss your choices with your academic advisor or exchange coordinator before finalizing your selection.





The academic departments and courses

Q: DAI, LSO, MSO, MIDO... Help! What do they all mean?

A: Dauphine - PSL uses acronyms to designate our academic departments.

DAI stands for *Direction des Affaires Internationales*, (International Affairs Office). The department offers courses designed specifically for international exchange students, including electives, French as a Foreign Language (FLE) and English-language versions of courses that are normally in French.

LSO stands for *Licence des Sciences des Organisations* (Bachelor's in Organization Sciences) The department offers **undergraduate** courses in Economics, Business & Management, Law, Sociology and Political Science.

MSO stands for *Master des Sciences des Organisations* (Master's in Organization Sciences). The department offers **graduate-level** courses in Economics, Business & Management, Law, Sociology and Political Science.

MIDO stands for *Mathématiques et Informatique de la Décision et des Organisations* (Mathématics and IT for Economics and Business). The department offers both **undergraduate and graduate** courses in Applied Mathematics and Computer Science. Access to MIDO courses is restricted to students majoring in Mathematics or Computer Science.

Q: How do I know what the course code means?

A: Course codes indicate the academic department, year of study, the semester in which the course is taught and the academic track to which it belongs.

The first character is a number between 0 and 5. 0 means that the course is offered by the International Affairs Office. Numbers 1 to 5 indicate the year of study. For example, 3 = third year of a Bachelor's program, 4 = 1st year of a Master's program and 5 = 2nd year of a Master's program.

Courses offered by the LSO, MSO and MIDO departments include four letters that indicate the academic track.

The final letter in the code refers to the semester when the course is taught. X = semester 1, Y = semester 2, and Z = semesters 1 and 2.

Take for example, undergraduate Business Law 3LMGOY74:

- 3L means that it is open to 3rd-year Bachelor's students
- MGO means that it is a course in the field of Organization Sciences
- Y means that it is taught in Semester 2
- 74 is an internal reference to distinguish between courses

Q: What are the different types of classes?

A: There are basically two types of class at Dauphine -PSL: lectures and tutorials. A lecture class is referred to as a *cours magistral* (CM) in French, while tutorials are known as travaux *dirigés* (TD). Tutorials are small-group classes that are extremely interactive, allow for teamwork and offer personalized supervision.

Q: How many class-hours per semester are there for a typical course?

A: While class hours per course may vary, a 6 ECTS course generally totals 30 class-hours (ex. 3 hours per week over a 10-week period) and a 3 ECTS course generally totals 15 class-





hours (ex. 1h30 per week over a 10-week period, OR 3 hours per week over a 5-week period). An additional 3 hours have to be accounted for the final exam.

Q: What are the language prerequisites for enrolling in a course taught in French?

A: Officially, the minimum proficiency level required is B2. However, given the academic level and technicity of our curriculum, we strongly recommend at least a C1-level. Students at a B2 level of proficiency often encounter difficulties following and obtaining passing grades in courses taught in French. A DELF or TCF certificate is mandatory to justify that level (for non-native French speakers).

Q: Is course attendance mandatory?

A: Yes, attendance is mandatory. Only a few professors allow a few unapproved absences. Unapproved/unjustified absences can have heavy consequences: being expelled from the class, getting a 0/20 continuous assessment grade. In general, anything that is not a medical emergency (family gatherings, trips, student jobs) will be seen as unjustified.

Q: I have exams at the beginning of January in my home university. Can I miss a few weeks of classes?

A: You can miss the classes taking place on your exam weeks. However, the beginning of the semester is crucial to your academic success. Many professors launch team projects and give assignments in week 1. The first weeks of class are also a time to lay foundations. It would be difficult to make up for what you miss and that could very well jeopardize your involvement in the class. Teachers may decide to not accept you in their class if you didn't attend from the beginning.

Q: Why does the schedule indicate that my course is divided in two blocks?

A: At Université Paris Dauphine - PSL, classes are divided into 90-minute blocks. All classes are at least 90 minutes long followed by a 15-minute break. If your class is 3 hours long, there are two 90-minute "blocks" with a 15-minute break in between. The first class begins at 8:30 am and the last class ends at 8:30 pm (so there is a total of seven 90-minute class blocks with six 15-minute breaks per day).

Q: Can my schedule change during the semester?

A: **Yes.** Class schedules may be subject to modification, so we recommend that you check the schedule daily. Some professors can miss a week and make up for it later in the semester or at another time during the week. As some of our teachers have a main professional activity, teaching being a secondary activity, there may be slight adjustments from one week to the next. Although it is rare, it is possible for a teacher to change his or her entire timetable for the semester at the last minute: in this case, you will only be able to switch courses if the change causes a timetable conflict.

Q: Who should I contact to benefit from adjustments for medical reasons?

A: Dauphine - PSL has a long-standing commitment to ensuring equal access to all programs, activities and university life for students with temporary, long-term or permanent disabilities. To benefit from adjustments, you should contact Dauphine - PSL Disability Services as soon as possible, and preferably at the very beginning of the semester (during Orientation Week for example): handicap@dauphine.psl.eu.

If you contact the service too late in the semester, it will not be possible for you to benefit from adjustments.

For more information, browse the Dauphine - PSL Guide for Disabled Students.

Q: Why can't I see my courses on my schedule?

A: This question can have different answers depending on when you ask it. You won't be able to see your schedule before the start of the semester. Then, if a course doesn't appear still, it's maybe because you are not registered. Contact courses.exchange@dauphine.psl.eu





if you encounter this issue. Technical difficulties can arise, so be patient while our staff is resolving the issue.

Exams and transcripts

Q: If I am unhappy with a grade, can I discuss it with the professor?

A: You are free to ask your professor for additional explanations about a grade. However, grades are not negotiable. Barring exceptional circumstances, all grades are final. If you have a doubt, you can always ask to see your final exam paper.

Q: When do the final exams take place?

A: Exam dates per academic track are indicated on the academic calendar. Usually, first semester exams take place in late December and second semester exams take place in mid-April or early May. If you select Master 2 level courses or courses in Law, Mathematics or Computer Science (all levels combined), the exams are generally later than for the other programmes (January for the first semester, May for the second semester).

Q: What is the French grading system?

A: Students are graded using a scale from 1 to 20. 10 is the minimum passing grade.

Q: Is it possible to retake an exam that I failed?

A: Université Paris Dauphine - PSL offers students the possibility to "resit" exams at the end of the academic year, usually in June or July in Paris only. The process to sit your exams remotely is explained earlier in this document.

Q: When can I expect to receive my transcript?

A: Official transcripts are sent directly to your home university. Fall semester exchange students will receive their transcripts in late February or early March. Some master programmes' juries may happen later, so be patient in those specific cases. Spring semester exchange students will receive their transcripts in June or July. You can also access your grades online via your MyDauphine account (my.dauphine.fr) under "Mes notes" ("My grades").

You cannot request specific grades or transcripts earlier. They're ready when they're ready.

Your transcripts are sent to your home university as soon as they are available. We expect your home university to forward them to you. If this is not the case, you can request that they be sent directly to you by contacting courses.exchange@dauphine.fr.
